

Understanding European lobbying

The European Union adopts legal acts that have an increasing impact on companies and public or private organisations. The acts adopted are the result of a complex process in which the three major institutions – the European Commission, the European Parliament and the European Council- hold a prominent place, yet allowing for a great number of other stakeholders – from institutions or not (Committee of the Regions, European Economic and Social Committee, think tanks, NGOs, media, lobbyists)- to interact and have themselves heard, according to constantly evolving rules and practices.

Anyone who would like to take part in the debate and express their ideas must know how to cleverly identify the relevant stakeholders involved, how they can actually intervene and when is a good time to assert their point of view all through the decision-making process.
